






Benefits of Certification






AICP SEEKS PARITY WITH LICENSURE

Eligibility & Process - AICP Application

- Bring membership up to date
- Review Eligibility Requirements
 - o Current member of APA
 - Be engaged in professional planning, either currently or in the past, as defined by AICP
 - Have completed, at the time of application submission, one of the combinations of education and corresponding years of professional planning experience (as listed on the APA/AICP website)

PATH TO BECOME AN AICP-CERTIFIED PLANNER




Women

Eligibility & Process - AICP Candidate

- Enroll in the program by submitting your education verification and paying the application fee
 - You can begin tracking Certification Maintenance credits
- Register for the AICP Certification Exam
- Take the exam prior to earning professional planning experience
 - Note: You must be part of an accredited planning program to enroll
- Earn your planning experience
- Submit your planning experience essays

Eligibility & Process - Costs

Traditional AICP Exam Costs:

\$70 Application
\$220 Essays (\$290 Expedited)
\$220 Exam Registration
\$100 Essay Appeal
\$100 Transfer Fee

AICP Candidate Exam Costs: \$35 Enrollment \$100 Exam Registration \$375/\$445 Essay Fees after exam passed, work experience gained & associated planning work essays submitted & approved (thus, becoming AICP)

Post Exam:

- AICP Dues in addition to APA membership
- Certification Maintenance free and for-cost educational activities

Eligibility & Process - Essays

3 Criterion

- **1.** Criterion 1: Demonstrate a Professional Level of Responsibility and Resourcefulness While Applying a Planning Process Appropriate to the Project or Situation
- 2. Criterion 2: Evaluate Multiple Impacts to a Community When Implementing Professional Planning Tasks


3. Criterion 3: Influence Public Decision Making in the Public Interest

Criterion Responses: General Tips

- Early Bird/Expedited Review
- Review the <u>AICP Essay Guide</u> in its entirety
- Review sample essays others have submitted
- Craft responses that are between 250 and 500 words
- Speak in first person (i.e. use the word "I" throughout the response) don't speak to what "the team" did
- Have your local Professional Development Officer or another AICP certified planner review your essays

Test Specifics

- May & November
- 3 hr 30 min
- 170 questions
 - Only 150 count 0
- 5 subject areas
 - Factual & situational content 0





* precise topic emphasis changes over time

Test Tips

APA Women & Planning

• Preparation

- o Choose **resources**, make a **plan**
- o Join/Make a study group
- Read a few core **textbooks**
- Focus on **emerging issues**
- Use cards to keep details fresh
- Take lots of **practice exams!**



Test Tips



• Exam day

- o Go in rested, etc.
- Think national
- Think APA
- Use the test to take the test
- o Use marking options, scratchpad
- Answer every question!



- Free resources from APA chapters recommended: Florida, Texas, Connecticut, Georgia, Iowa, Ohio (see next slide for FL offer!)
- Recommended Textbooks (read, at least, 1 each of ethics, history/theory and standards; buy, rent, get ebook from public libraries):
 - Contemporary Urban Planning John M. Levy (strong coverage of history & theory; easy to follow)
 - Local Planning: Contemporary Principles and Practice ("Green Book") ICMA Press (digest of standards for most areas of practice)
 - Planning and Urban Design Standards APA, Frederick R. Steiner (digest of standards for most areas of practice)
 - Essential Readings in Urban Planning Planetizen Press (textbook of historically influential articles on planning theory)
 - Everyday Ethics for Practicing Planners Carol Barrett (APA-endorsed analysis of ethics standards + practice scenarios)
- Planning prep webpage (free but maybe outdated?) https://www.planningprep.com/
- Free note/flash card websites StudyShack, Quizlet, Brainscape (be sure to confirm the accuracy of content!)
